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



Through a partnership with the Saratoga Springs Police Department a permanent prescription drug drop-off box was established in the lobby of the police station in City Hall. The drop-off box allows anyone to dispose of their unwanted, unused or expired medications without having to wait for a drug take-back event.

196 Sixth Graders Benefited from All **Stars Camp!** For over 10 years The Prevention Council has partnered with Saratoga Springs School District to provide All Stars Camp for students transitioning from elementary to middle school. All Star Camp booster sessions continue for 7 months during the school year with lunch time and after school programs. 5th grade student families receive registration forms by mail in March. The Community Coalition for Family Wellness (CCFW) had a phenomenal year of youth led engagement! Youth led panels provided much needed perspective regarding substance use. In 2014 the CCFW led a drugged driving social media campaign, implemented a transition to high school program and partnered with the SADD club's Above the Influence campaign.



R.A.I.S Our Voice! (Recovery Advocacy in Saratoga) was launched this past summer and has grown to over 150 people. Inspired by the film "The Anonymous People," shown in Saratoga, RAIS began with a conversation that our area needed a voice of recovery to reduce the stigma of addiction and promote wellness in long-term recovery by changing public perception of the disease and those affected by it. The Saratoga Partnership for Prevention administered the Youth Behavior Survey at Saratoga Springs high school Survey findings were used to create a new campaign teaching "perception isn't reality" regarding substance use. Parent University continues to educate, spark dialogue and provide skills to assist parents in supporting their children

through the developmental years.



2014 Safe Spring was widely successful, reaching **2000 students!** Super Star, celebrated prevention and addiction speaker, spoke at 5 large assemblies in Mechanicville, Waterford-Halfmoon, Ballston Spa, Saratoga Springs and Shenendehowa High Schools.

In 2014,

we provided:

- ➡ In-school Student Assistance Counseling and general counseling for 450 students seeking mental health support services.
- Reconnecting Youth classes for 88 at-risk students in Stillwater and South Glens Falls to increase self-esteem, communication skills and healthy decision making.
- TIPS responsible beverage training for 24 bartenders and servers.
- 15 individuals received opioid and heroin overdose prevention training.
- STOP DWI programs reached over 150 students in Stillwater, Waterford-Halfmoon and Saratoga Springs school
