2015Accomplishments



4,235 students in all 12 school districts in Saratoga County received prevention education programming in 2015!

Prevention education covered topics such as: underage drinking, substance use, life and social skills, bully prevention, distracted driving, media literacy and interpersonal skills. From elementary to high school, prevention educators deliver curricula that research has shown makes a difference in children's lives.



This has been a monumental year in changing the conversation and treatment of drug use, abuse and dependence.

So much has begun to change at the state, and national levels and RAIS is the emerging local voice for Recovery. Recovery Advocacy in Saratoga (RAIS) is a volunteer led project supported by The Prevention Council. RAIS's mission is to eliminate the stigma associated with addiction by promoting long-term recovery as a life affirming movement to unite communities and families. Throughout the year, monthly meetings are held at Saratoga Springs Public library. In April RAIS partnered with FOR-NY (Friends of Recovery) in hosting a Community Listening Forum at which nearly 20 community members in recovery spoke about their experiences and areas of need to a collection of community leaders. In late summer, RAIS held a candlelight vigil on International Overdose Awareness Day to honor those lost to addiction. Nearly 100 individuals and families gathered in Congress Park to share memories. As 2015 wrapped up, RAIS volunteers participated in First Night Saratoga by bringing a Tree of Hope to the event. Many First Night participants stopped at the Tree and added an ornament in memory of a loved one or to celebrate a recovery. Learn more about RAIS at: www.RAISaratoga.org

2015 was a great year of prevention, education, and community building! Examples of the coalition's accomplishments supported by the Drug Free Communities grant in the past year include:

Healthy Activities for Teens Pine Knolls Alliance Church organized an After Prom Party for South High Juniors. The event was a success with over 60 students in attendance.

71 students attended the Student Leadership Conference at Camp Chingachgook.

Mentoring Big Brothers/Big Sisters facilitates an afterschool transition program, matching 8th graders with a sophomore or junior for the school year.

Changing Perceptions The social norms campaign entered a new phase with improved numbers. Fewer teens are using alcohol and marijuana.

STOP DWI in Saratoga was highly successful reaching over 12,000 people!

Education and prevention programs were held throughout the county on topics such as internet safety, the teen brain and distracted driving. Innovative engagement was done through a series of Drug leopardy contests. Educational outreach via materials educating on prom safety, destructive decisions and more were distributed and posted throughout Saratoga County. The Saratoga Youth Action was created which is a network of youth groups throughout Saratoga County whose focus is to encourage their peers and community to make healthy life choices. 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Did you know that nearly I in 3 students report being bullied during the school year

and that school-based bullying prevention programs decrease bullying by up to 25%. Thanks to the generosity of the Saratoga Chapter of the Renegade Pigs the Prevention Council provided bullying prevention assemblies in several Saratoga County School Districts.

In 2015 we received a second round of funding from the New York Council on **Problem Gambling to continue The You(th)**

Decide Project which raises awareness among youth and adults about the risks of youth gambling. Sessions were conducted on media literacy where youth examined popular advertisements for gambling activities from scratch-offs to casino games, and scrutinize methods advertisers use to engage their audience. Policy resolution was also a focus with teams of youth and adults working with community organizations addressing the importance of reducing youth access to gambling activities.

New York is in the midst of a prescription opioid overdose and heroin epidemic

This year The Prevention Council led multiple community education forums about the issue, provided trainings on Narcan- the lifesaving medication that can stop or reverse the effects of an opioid overdose and conducted community assessments to gauge the scope of addiction and perceptions regarding opioids and heroin.
